## Future direction for flood and coastal erosion risk management (FCERM) in England - Summary of engagement to date

To start this initiative, in May 2017 the Environment Agency had a small number of conversations to help design an approach that would ensure our partners' advice, expertise, and practical support would be used efficiently and successfully.

This feedback confirmed the Environment Agency's own desire to make this an **open and collaborative process**, and to start that collaboration at the beginning of the work, at the scoping stage. This view is captured by these responses:

"There is a thirst and desire and a wish to be involved—more than people have traditionally recognised or been prepared to accept."

"The scope is critically important and is where I'd want to make sure we get the depth and breadth in framing it."

In response to this feedback, we are collaborating from the beginning of this work and are currently working on **agreeing the scope**: to identify the challenges that we want to address. To help do this we have discussed the scope at:

- The Flood and Coastal Erosion Risk Management Stakeholder Forum events (Birmingham, 3 July and London, 13 November). The Forum was asked a number of questions in relation to developing a new strategic direction. Key points raised by Forum members include:
  - $\circ$  Understanding flood risk and the integrated nature of water.
  - Focussing on outcomes.
  - Joining up everything through partnerships, collaborations and engagement.
