A panel of specialists have completed an assessment of the Hydraulic Fracture Plan (HFP) for well PNR 1/1z submitted by Cuadrilla Bowland Ltd on 24 July 2017 to satisfy Pre-Operational Condition 3 of the Environmental Permit EPR/AB3101MW. The HFP now forms part of the Operator's Environmental Management System required in permit condition 1.1.1 and forms an operating technique under condition 2.3.1.

Condition 2.4.4 prevents the operator from carrying on the groundwater activity A5 until the measures specified in pre-operational condition 3 of Schedule 1, table S1.3 have been completed.

We require the information in the HFP in order to assess fracture growth and understand any risk to groundwater (requirement under Groundwater Directive). The plan must also demonstrate that the fractures remain within the permitted boundary which in this case is the top of the Upper Bowland formation, (requirement under Mining Waste Directive).

A number of revisions have been made throughout the assessment process and the final version was received on the 29 June 2018.

We now consider that the information provided in the HFP for PNR 1/1z satisfies our requirements and those of Pre Operational Condition P03 of the Environmental Permit.

The key elements of the plan are:

Microseismic monitoring

We consider that the proposals for microseismic monitoring are proportionate to the planned operations and adequate measures are in place for the protection of groundwater.

Fault reactivation

This is fundamental to understanding whether existing faults could be reactivated by the fracturing process, and therefore create a pathway beyond the permit boundary into groundwater bearing strata above.

The fault reactivation assessment concluded that the risk of faults reactivating is mitigated by the staged control of the injections and by seismic monitoring.

Mitigation Measures

We note the commitments in section 5.0 p) of the HFP to assess and review the injection rates and pressures and to adjust the injection program in the event that the monitoring data indicates fractures or fault interactions with preferential flow pathways towards the edge of the permitted boundary.

Reporting

Cuadrilla commits to provide information on a daily basis throughout the fracturing programme, as detailed in section 6.0 of the HFP. We will also request to see any additional data we deem necessary in accordance with our regulatory powers in a timely manner. For example, seismic

event location diagrams to coincide with information provided in the morning report. We will put in place a programme of audits and inspections during the injection stages to verify the data that is being used to inform the fracturing programme.

Relevant permit conditions

As well as operating within the parameters established by the approved HFP, specific permit conditions are applicable to the hydraulic fracturing activities; 1.1.1 and 2.3.1 as mentioned above and 2.4.4 as it applies to the pre operational requirements. In addition the operator should note condition 3.5.5 regarding calibration and use of monitoring equipment. Testing and confirmation of performance of the geophones must also be part of this system.

Further information

Certain information stills needs to be submitted prior to hydraulic fracturing commencing, the operator has undertaken to provide:

- Geophone location and calibration we will expect assurance of calibration methods when a Contractor has been instructed by Cuadrilla. (we shall conduct a site inspection at the time of the testing using the downhole source.)
- Source & geophone array testing we are expecting to see the results, showing a
 definite recording from the furthest available fracture stage position at which the test
 source can be physically emplaced and fired.
- Noise monitoring, at the time of geophone installation, together with a review of the magnitude sensitivity of the array vs range, in the ambient noise conditions, based on the use of the test source of known energy input.
