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Good Morning Nick

Comments as follows

- 1) Yes materials can be reused (provided they are suitable) as part of the project – provided it is part of the works and completed in a similar timescale, subject to planning permission if required.. We would accept that the material has not been discarded and is there for not waste. The alternative would be to crush the material to produce an aggregate if the crusher has a mobile plant licence or local authority licence and the aggregate is produced to a specification it would not be regarded as waste.
- 2) Yes the contractor can consign the waste but the quantities of waste and relevant recovery or disposal codes would need to be recorded by Kimberly Clark. The only exception would be materials or equipment which are salvaged and sold / reused for the same purpose (ie not discarded in a legal context). There are specific criteria which need to be met and the items or materials must be removed at source (not subsequently separated from waste materials).

Happy to discuss – feel free to give me a call

It is possible that I may need to visit at some point during the demolition so please keep me informed of progress. In general terms it would be helpful to confirm the site is clean / free from contamination before the new machine is installed.

Hi Jon

Just a quick update and a few questions for clarification. The Barrow project continues to move forward with some speed. We are today meeting our potential environmental consultants to help with the permit variation, so would hope to start having some dialogue with you on this aspect soon. The timescales we shared when you were on site have not changed significantly and the detail of the proposal remains the same.

1. During your visit we touched on potentially reusing some of the demolition arisings for other aspects of the project on site. This would be soil and crushed concrete that could be used to back fill the fire water lagoon to create a hard standing area. At the time of your visit I recall that we discussed that this would not be classed as a waste, as it was not leaving site and we were re-using it for it intended purpose. Can you please confirm that I understood this correctly.

2. We are in the process of contract a single demolition contractor to manage the whole process of clearing the PM1 area ready for the civil works to be able to house the new machine. We accept we would still carry a duty of care for any waste arisings, but under these circumstances what is the legal position on who is the waste producer from a waste reporting point of view. Could the demolition contractor be classed as the waste producer for all demolition arisings and then account for the waste on their quarterly returns or does it have to go on ours.
