Shanklin Coastal Defence Scheme

The Environment Agency, in partnership with the Isle of Wight Council, are progressing plans to upgrade 900 metres of coastal defences in Shanklin to reduce the impact of flood and coastal erosion.

What have we been doing so far?




Outline Business Case submitted to independent assurance board. Approval unlocked £1.9 million to progress the scheme to the detailed design stage in 2025.

Programmed computer models to analyse the area and level of flooding anticipated under different scenarios.



Completed below ground explorations to assess ground conditions and underground structures, including the seawall foundations.
