### Councillors vote for flood scheme

resolved to grant us planning
permission for the scheme. This

## Planning application update

#### Planning committee

On Monday 15 July, Oxfordshire County Council's Planning and Regulation Committee met to determine our planning application. This followed the planning officer's recommendation to approve.

The planning officers first presented their findings to the committee. The councillors then heard from objectors, our supporters, and finally the project team.

The committee debated the application before voting that they were resolved to grant planning permission. Their approval is subject to certain requirements that are standard for an application of this size and complexity.

#### Referral to the Secretary of State

A requirement of approval is that the application is first referred to the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government. She will decide if she wishes to make her own determination on the application. This is due to the scheme being located in the green belt, and is standard for applications like ours.

#### **Section 106 Agreement**

A Section 106 Agreement is an agreement between a local authority and an applicant attached to a planning permission. It must be directly relevant to the proposed development and can relate to compensation or mitigation of impacts. In our case, it relates to the management and monitoring required for the habitats being provided.



# **Next steps**



## **Compulsory Purchase Order**

The public inquiry closed on 26 January 2024 and the inspector's report has been submitted to the Secretary of State for Defra. They will decide whether to confirm, modify or not confirm the CPO. We anticipate that a decision will be made this summer.



## **Biodiversity Net Gain**

We are committed to delivering a minimum Biodiversity Net Gain of 10% through a combination of new on and offsite habitats, all within Oxfordshire. We are working with landowners to reach agreements to create and manage these new habitats.



## Second planning application

We intend to submit a second planning application shortly to provide access to South Hinksey rail sidings. The application will seek permission for a temporary access track, allowing us to move excavated material from the construction site to the rail sidings for transport by train.
